Further steps

Following a review of the effectiveness of the steps we are taking this year to ensure that there is no slavery or human trafficking in our supply chains we intend to take the following further steps to combat slavery and human trafficking:

- As part of our contracting processes with suppliers, to negotiate the inclusion of a requirement to comply with all applicable anti-slavery and human trafficking laws, statutes, regulations and codes from time to time in force including but not limited to the Modern Slavery Act 2015.
- Develop and implement awareness training for relevant employees on the recognition and mitigation of slavery and human trafficking.

This statement is made and published pursuant to section 54(1) of the Modern Slavery Act 2015 and constitutes our slavery and human trafficking statement for the financial year ending 31 December 2022.
